FATHER FRANKLY SPEAKING...

Dear Friends,

When a parish vicar or rector retires or moves on to another post in the US Episcopal Church, where I served for many decades, it is common for the Church Council to appoint a Search Committee whose job it is to find a new spiritual leader for the congregation. This is done of course in conjunction with the Bishop and his or her staff. A parish profile prepared, inquiries are made, discrete adverts placed in clergy journals, and the like. And after a period of discernment and prayer, the name of the new rector is announced amid much rejoicing.

It has occurred to me that it would be really nice if every Anglican parish and Chaplaincy Council could establish for itself a permanent search committee. No. Not for a new priest or chaplain. But for new lay members. Just think. We could profile our Chaplaincy and place an advert on the Internet someplace; *ExPatLoop*, perhaps. Or the *Budapest Business Journal*. "Applications now being taken. Send CV and three references."

We could then narrow down our search to just those individuals and families we would really like to have as members of our church community, interview them, and sign them up. Brilliant. Church growth problem solved. Except that it does not quite work that way. Nowadays for many people, church is an alien and sometimes even antiquated concept. Many of our contemporaries have only the vaguest notion of what church is or what goes on inside one. And some of them are pretty sure they do not want to find out.

So, how to get people to church...? How to tell them about Christ and his Gospel...?

Well, when you get right down to it, there are only three things which have been proven beyond dispute to get people past the doors and into the church, be it a grand cathedral in the city or a humble A-frame in the suburbs. And happily for Church Councils everywhere, they cost absolutely nothing, are great fun, and are extremely effective. What are they?



Simple. 1. Invite. 2. Invite. 3. Invite. That's it. After all, people do not go to dinner parties without an invitation. Jesus even has a parable about that. And they are unlikely to go to church without one either. Fact is, Churches only see new people and grow when their current members invite others to come to church with them.

So, when was the last time you invited someone to church with you on Sunday morning? If it has been twenty-eight years, or you simply cannot remember, it is definitely time for another go at it. This can of course be a scary proposition for a mild-mannered Anglican who has always taken religion as an intensely private matter. Still, there is no getting around it. The Gospel is clear about our responsibility to spread the Good News. Just ask any Apostle. But how to do it with good Anglican grace?

First, you really must take the responsibility seriously and intend to do it. You might even pledge to invite a certain number of guests during the year at the same time you make your financial pledge. Make a list, mental or otherwise, of people you

know. Relatives. Friends. Co-workers. The lady across the street. Brits. Hungarians. Kenyans. North Americans. English-speakers for the most part, to be sure.

Now, go through your list and identify the two or three people you are realistically most likely to want to invite to church with you. Maybe even make a plan. And deal with the fear of rejection ahead of time. After all, what is the worst thing that could possibly happen? Probably just that they might say, “No, thank you.” That is about it. And how horrible is that...?

Incidentally, do not think you will not know enough about the Church to bring up the subject of churchgoing. No one knows enough. That is not the point. You undoubtedly know more about your Church than does your friend. And religion is after all one of the great topics of all ages; and like it or leave it, most people are at least curious about Church.



Keep in mind that your friend may have as much fear of accepting your invitation as you had in extending it. “I won’t know the hymns.” “Will I have to pray out loud or kneel?” “I don’t know how they do communion.” “People will stare at me.” “They might try to convert me.”

Your conversation might deal with some of these fears even if they are not specifically raised. “I’ll help you find the hymns.” “I’ll introduce you to people, if you would like.” “Father John is a really good preacher.” “You know, we have someone at church who is just as interested in Metallica as you are.”

All the special events that come up at church also offer excellent opportunities to introduce others to Saint Margaret’s. “We’re having a children’s service soon. I’ll bet your kids would really love it.” “You’ve never met a bishop? Ours is coming to our church. Would you like to meet him?” “We’re having a church luncheon with wonderful dishes from Nigeria and elsewhere. It would be brilliant if you could come along.” You get the idea.

How many times should you invite the same person? Probably not more than a couple. You don’t want to be a pest. Likewise, don’t assume that everyone you invite and bring will automatically like Saint Margaret’s, much less join the congregation. In fact, the experts in such things say that only about one in four may even consider doing so.

So, is it worth the effort? Absolutely. Bringing someone to church, and thus to Christ, perhaps for the first time in a long time, can be one of the most rewarding experiences in faith. Remember, you and I would not be coming to church now ourselves if someone somewhere had not first brought us. Or as our Hungarian friends might remind us...

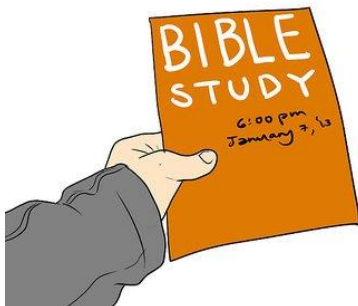

SAINT MARGARET'S VISITS ESZTERGOM



A group of some twenty pilgrims from Saint Margaret's recently visited Esztergom, the primatial see of Hungary, and its famous Chapel dedicated to the English Saint Thomas Becket, where one of his only remaining relics was kept for centuries.

Just north of Budapest, Esztergom has been a cultural and religious centre of Hungary ever since Saint Stephen was crowned there as Hungary's first king a thousand years ago. Like Canterbury in England, Esztergom is the seat of Hungary's archbishop primate, currently Cardinal Péter Erdő. And Catholicism remains the predominant faith of Hungary but with large minorities of Presbyterians and Lutherans. And a faithful handful of Anglicans.

According to legend and available historical records, Thomas Becket and Lukács Bánfi, both later to become archbishops in their respective homelands, became lifelong friends during their student days in Paris. Upon Becket's martyrdom in 1170, Bánfi somehow secured a relic of his friend, a small bone fragment, and had it brought to Esztergom where it has been kept with great reverence ever since; originally in the Chapel but most recently in a beautiful reliquary within the Cathedral itself for safekeeping.



Members of Saint Margaret's were able to visit the Becket Chapel and recite Anglican Morning Prayer within its walls, probably the first such service ever held there. The group was later greeted warmly by one of the canons of the Cathedral, the Revd Árpád Bársony. "We were able to tour the cathedral, the largest church in Hungary," explains Father Frank, "and we also visited the tomb of the famed Cardinal Jozsef Mindszenty, a hero of the 1956 Hungarian Revolution." Following a lunch of traditional Hungarian picnic fare, the group returned home to Budapest spiritually enriched and renewed.

Avoid Cyber Fraud At Church...



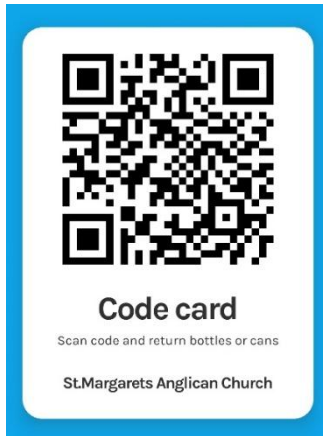
It has come to our attention that there were a couple of recent online email-based fraud attempts against Saint Margaret's parishioners. In each instance, the fraudster posed as a friend from church and purported to offer an annuity or loan of some sort to help needy people in return for so-called set-up fees. The whole thing was of course a sham. And a shame...

Saint Margaret's will never ask you to participate in any such shady financial scheme. If you are contacted by someone posing as a fellow parishioner and asking for money for any purpose, please contact Father Frank or a Churchwarden at once. Above all, do not exchange any money or personal information or details.

Meanwhile, be sure to educate yourself about such sadly widespread fraud. There are literally hundreds of articles online covering all aspects of the problem.

Fraudsters, as you can imagine, consider church-goers gullible and an easy mark for their attempted swindles. Happily, neither of our congregants fell for the scam, and nothing of value was lost. But always be wary...

The Recycle Scheme At Saint Margaret's...

It is simple...

You may have noticed the new automated REpont recycling equipment where you shop for groceries. Read about the project here: <https://repoint.hu/en>.

The refund due for your returned cans and bottles will be deposited automatically into the Saint Margaret's bank account, where the money will be put to good use in support of our ministries.



Here is how it works...

- Download the screenshot of the code card above which can also be found online here: shorturl.at/PL4cJ;
- Take your empty plastic or glass bottles or aluminum cans to your favourite supermarket with a greenish-yellow REpont recycling machine;
- Remember, only those products are recyclable that have this sign next to the barcode;
- Scan the QR-code with the machine's scanner, or red laser;
- If it greets you as *Anglican Church*, start placing your bottles and cans into the machine;
- If it does not recognise the QR code, scan it again; some machines unfortunately do not work properly;
- Once you are done with recycling your bottles and cans, press the *Banki Utalás*, or *Bank Transfer*, button on the screen, and it will transfer the money right into the Church's bank account.
- Tell your family, friends, and neighbours;

Data Privacy **At Saint Margaret's...**

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Unless subject to an exemption under the GDPR, you have the following rights with respect to your personal data:

- The right to request a copy of your personal data which the Chaplaincy Council of Saint Margaret's Anglican Episcopal Church, Budapest, holds about you;
- The right to request that the Chaplaincy Council of Saint Margaret's Anglican Episcopal Church, Budapest, correct any personal data if it is found to be inaccurate or out of date;
- The right to request your personal data is erased where it is no longer necessary for the Chaplaincy Council of Saint Margaret's Anglican Episcopal Church, Budapest, to retain such data;
- The right to withdraw your consent to the processing at any time;
- The right to request that the data controller provide the data subject with his/her personal data and where possible, to transmit that data directly to another data controller, (known as the right to data portability);
- The right, where there is a dispute in relation to the accuracy or processing of your personal data, to request a restriction be placed on further processing;
- The right to object to the processing of personal data, (where applicable) [*Only applies where processing is based on legitimate interests (or the performance of a task in the public interest/exercise of official authority); direct marketing and processing for the purposes of scientific/historical research and statistics*]
- The right to lodge a complaint with the Information Commissioners Office.

To exercise all relevant rights, to make queries or complaints, please in the first instance contact the Chaplain, the Rev. Dr. Frank Hegedűs; or Churchwardens Mr Goprdon Cross or Mr. Ian Johnson.

We will not tolerate the abuse of children or adults in any form.

- The care, nurture, and respectful pastoral ministry of all children, young persons and adults
- The safeguarding and protection of all children, young persons and adults who may be vulnerable
- The establishing of safe, caring communities which provide a loving environment where there is a culture of 'informed vigilance' as to the dangers of abuse.
- The careful selection and training of all those with any safeguarding responsibility within the Church, including the use of available criminal records disclosures and relevant vetting and barring schemes.
- Preventing abuse or the likelihood of abuse by encouraging and adopting a pro-active stance to safeguarding; responding to the slightest concern whether by rumour, speculation or from an anonymous source – every safeguarding concern will be taken seriously.
- Ensuring that any concern about safeguarding must be passed onto someone in the Diocesan Safeguarding Team as there are no legal barriers to sharing such concerns.
- Responding without delay to every complaint made which suggests that a child, young person or adult may have been harmed - co-operating with the local police, relevant local agencies and any other relevant body (eg other faith groups) in any investigation.
- Seeking to work with anyone who has suffered abuse, developing with them an appropriate ministry of informed pastoral care.
- Seeking to challenge any abuse of power, especially by anyone in a position of trust.
- Seeking to offer pastoral care and support, including supervision and referral to the proper authorities, to any member of our church community known to have offended against a child, young person or vulnerable adult.

Saint Margaret's PayPal Account...

We now have PayPal links on our website, www.anglicanbudapest.org, under the DONATIONS tab. Fantastic, modern, progressive, we hear you saying. But what exactly is it? And, is something like PayPal really necessary or even appropriate for a church?

The PayPal logo is displayed in its characteristic blue, italicized font with a trademark symbol.

Simply put, PayPal is a bank account. But hang on again, you may well be thinking. We already have a bank account or two.

Do we need another? Well, perhaps you do. PayPal is also a bank account, you see, in the same way an email is also a letter. It is an electronic bank account.

Many of you reading this may not live in Budapest, in Hungary, or even in Europe. Sorry for that of course. But perhaps you would still like to make the odd donation to Saint Margaret's from time to time – or regularly. But how...? That is the question.

In the past, any donations from abroad have had to be transferred in the traditional way by logging on or by actually going to the bank; filling in a ton of forms; and making an international transfer, complete with lengthy account, IBAN, and BIC numbers, SWIFT and PIN codes, mum's maiden name, and who knows what else. And then, there is the not-insignificant matter of transfer fees. To be blunt, it is a hassle.



That is where an e-bank like PayPal comes in handy. It lets you send your donation once -- or regularly -- quickly and easily. Sort of like using a bank or credit card. It is easy, instant, and free. And, it does not matter what currency your payment

originates in.

So, there you have it. That is why Saint Margaret's now has a PayPal donation option. When you send your next donation -- this holiday season or next summer -- be it little or large -- simply click the PayPal button on the DONATIONS page at the website and make your generosity known. It is as simple -- and important -- as that!
